

A BOOK I HAVE READ AND HIGHLY RECOMMEND

Toxic Charity: How Churches and Charities Hurt Those They Help (And How to Reverse It)

Robert D. Lupton HarperOne New York ISBN 978 - 0- 06-207621 – 2

It is likely that you have a sizeable number of bubbles in your head. This book will likely burst many of them. It is another one of those *ouch*, *I don't like that* books, but the truth of it is highly convicting. If you truly care about helping hurting people, you need to read this book. With an open mind! You cannot be Christ-like and ignore people in need. Like most Christians, I have spent a lifetime doing my sincerest best to be a true helper. I wish I had read this book when I was young. It enunciates what I have painfully come to realize through many (and mostly) futile efforts.

Lupton neither discourages helping the needy nor does he question the motives of those who give. He does take a critical look at the way it's generally done: by governments, by foundations, by people with means and by churches. In the long-run, the standard top down approach rarely helps. When it comes to aid, dependency and the destruction of personal initiative are always lurking nearby. Lupton states it well, "When we do for those in need what they have the capacity to do for themselves, we disempower them." He goes on to say, "When relief does not transition to development in a timely way, compassion becomes toxic."

Lupton speaks from a lifetime of experience. The book is not *religious* per se, although Christians are the most deeply compassionate of all earth's people. The book deals at length with churches and other religious charities, but it deals with charitable help whether the help is from a church or a government. Regardless of who is attempting the help, there are many common denominators as well as some things that work and some that don't. This book is full of wisdom and sound advice.

Toxic Charity will cause you to take a second look at what you are doing to help the needy and how you are doing it. Lupton does not have the final answer on charity, but he does have much to say. Few books have shaken me as deeply as this one. It is concise, well-written, authoritative and less than 200 pages. You owe it to yourself to read this book.
