IN THE LONG RUN, NOTHING ELSE REALLY MATTERS

So many things are immediately important: health, education, job, mate, family, home, comfort, freedom, money, power, acceptance and so much more. Regardless of how much money, prestige or power a person has, it's all quite fleeting. At best, our earthly trip is very short. King Solomon pointed out that there is one common equalizer out there. *"For that which befalleth the sons of men befalleth beasts; even one thing befalleth them: as the one dieth, so dieth the other; yea, they have all one breath; so that a man hath no preeminence above a beast," Ecclesiastes 3:19.* Death levels the playing-field. Status, money, health, gender, color do not matter. When the casket comes (and it always comes), the true question is not *"What did he do?"* It's *"Where did he go? Where is he now?"*

Where are you going when you leave here? You know you're going to leave; it's just a matter of time. That spirit of yours is going somewhere. There are only two options; it's either heaven or hell. Nobody accidentally stumbles into heaven; people go to heaven only by deliberate choice. Eternity beyond the grave hinges entirely on what a person does with Jesus Christ during his mortal journey on this earth. Those who accept Him as Savior will go to heaven when they die. Those who don't, won't. It's clear-cut. *"He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life: and he that believeth not the Son shall not see life; but the wrath of God abideth on him," John 3:36. "He that hath the Son hath life; and he that hath not the Son of God hath not life," 1 John 5:12.*

In the name of God and religion, men have screw-up and confused lots of things, including how to be saved from eternal damnation. They have brought in baptism, all kinds of good works, church membership, holy living, every imaginable ceremony, sincerity and mental gymnastics. Jesus made preparation for death which is inevitable extremely simple. He said, *"God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. For God sent not his Son into the world to condemn the world; but that the world through him might be saved. He that believeth on him is not condemned: but he that believeth not is condemned already, because he hath not believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God," John 3:16-18.* That's downright simple. Where you go when you die depends on what you do with Jesus Christ in your heart; not all that other *stuff*. The instant you trust Him in your heart, He'll save you. Until you trust Him, nothing else will count.

I plead with you to come to Him right now. Face up to the fact that you are a sinner who without external help will spend eternity in hell. Come to grips with the fact that cannot make heaven on your own; you're not capable of somehow rescuing yourself from eternal damnation. Only one person can help you when death, the great equalizer of all men arrives. That person is Jesus Christ who came to this planet to save you by doing for you that which you couldn't do for yourself. He took your sins into His own body, went to the cross, shed His own blood for you, died in your place and rose again in three days. He's alive today, and forever more. He stands ready to save you this very instant. All he asks you to do is believe on Him. He used the word *"believe"* in the sense of personal trust, not simply believing the facts about Him.

It happens in the heart, and there is no salvation or hope beyond the grave until it happens there. A trip down front in a church, baptism, sincerity, penance, turning over a new leaf, passionate praying, confessing your sins and all the good works in the world will never get the job done. You have to have a Savior, and there's only one. You must come to the end of yourself, give up on you and all other hope. You must trust Him as your only hope. It's not merely a pretty or emotional religious experience; it's a crisis moment in the heart when Jesus Christ becomes your only hope beyond this mortal life.

Christianophobia: A Faith Under Attack

This is an excellent book which surely should be read, especially by every person who values freedom; and particularly by Christians. Though the book is in its second printing, it is doubtful that it will ever get the readership it deserves, especially in the United States. (1) Free people are apathetic, (2) too many Christians are unconcerned about what's going on beyond their comfort zones and (3) the book is not an easy, quick read. Furthermore, (4) it has a painful, eerily sobering message.

Christianophobia is about widespread, rampant religious and secular intolerance against Christians and Christian communities in multiple countries. Mr. Shortt says the problem has worsened dramatically since the turn of the millennium. When he first published this book in 2012, about 200,000 million Christians were under threat. *Christianophobia* looks in depth at 12 nations where hatred of Christians and persecution are the most rampant and severe. The 13th chapter takes a short glance at 6 other anti-Christian nations

An ironic, but common thread in all of these anti-Christian nations is their claims of *Freedom of Religion*. In actual practice, the claims mean very little. The claims of *Freedom of Religion* are erased in the details and definitions of what religious liberty looks like, who qualifies and lack of enforcement. Regardless of what the constitutions of these countries say about religious liberty, it doesn't exist. In country after country, violence includes burning of churches and seizure properties, arrests of pastors and church members, destruction of their homes and properties, beatings, rapes, murders and long prison times with hard labor. Christians are often denied basic food, shelter, jobs and police protection. Civil authorities routinely ignore complaints even for the vilest of acts. Police commonly stand by while Christians are being raped and murdered, churches and homes are being burned and little children are beheaded. It is common for those under attack to be arrested and jailed while the perpetrators are untouched.

A common denominator across the board is the blurring of religion and nationalism. Families, clans and ethnic groups, communities and those who embrace certain religions view Christianity (and other religions) as a threat to their unity, ways of life and nationalism. They see converts as traitors, and those who make converts as enemies. Locals, communities and nations often accuse Christians of converting them by force. They lose their wrath on the Christians whom they perceive as enemies. When the Christians defend themselves or fight back, they're accused of being trouble-makers. They're usually falsely accused and arrested. Their enemies tell families, friends and law enforcement. The media plays a huge role. They paint Christians as corrosive, evil, troublemakers and dividers of families and communities. They fan the fires of hatred against Christians. Many times, the result is mob violence and unjust retaliation.

Christianophobia is well researched and documented. There are 269 pages of country-by-country analysis. Many of the countries are Mideastern and eastern from Egypt and Turkey through Iran, Iraq, Pakistan, India and on to China, Viet Nam and North Korea. Mr. Shortt takes a short look at Cuba, Venezuela, Belarus, Sri Lanka, Laos and the Sudan. There are 15 pages of references.

Readers of this book should keep in mind that Mr. Shortt uses the term *Christian* in a broad sense as do most who persecute Christians. To them "Christians" are all basically alike; and to be hated, resisted and persecuted, if not eliminated. They are considered to be divisive, trouble-makers and dangerous to national unity and loyalty. Enemies of Christianity do not quibble about theology, doctrine and differences.

Every true Christian should read this sobering book. Most American Christians feel pretty insulated and secure. We don't seem to think it can happen here. I'm afraid we're in for a rude awakening. Read your Bible, and a little Christian history about our forefathers. Look around the world today. There is no reason to think we are better than our Christian forefathers, and our Christian brothers and sisters around the world today.

Christianophobia is a shot over the bow. I strongly recommend it.

"The Spirit and the bride say, Come. And let him that heareth say, Come. And let him that is athirst come. And whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely."

Preaching God's Word has always been a joy and privilege for me. Occasionally, I have found impersonating a Bible person to be a liberating way to pour your entire being into that person.

Faces were stunned on Sunday morning at Northwest Baptist Church as this stranger walked in at preaching time and began to unfold the glorious message of Jesus Christ as seen through the eyes of the apostle Paul. I can identify with Paul who said, *"I thank Christ Jesus our Lord, who hath enabled me, for that he counted me faithful, putting me into the ministry."*

WHAT'S SO WRONG WITH DOING RIGHT?

If you were choosing people to write books, I would probably be way down toward the end of your list. We're in this crazy world where *"Judgment is turned away backward, and justice standeth afar off: for truth is fallen in the street, and equity cannot enter,"* **Isaiah 59:14**. It seems to me that somebody ought to say something, but too few of us are.



What's So Wrong with Doing Right grew out of the passion of my own heart, the responses that spontaneously leap from my soul in view of the flow of glaring evil that is before us. It is not another book of Bible studies or sermons. I'm obviously not against good commentaries and better preaching, but *What's So Wrong with Doing Right* is Christian apologetic. The apostle Peter said, *"Sanctify the Lord God in your hearts: and be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear,"* **1 Peter 3:15**. To the best of my ability, that's what *What's So Wrong with Doing Right* is. It doesn't answer everything; it does address many of the devastating ills in this world in which we live. An underlying theme is that true biblical Christianity is the only medicine that can cure the ills facing this world today.

Except for a few technical issues, the book is done. Unexpected complications asserted themselves in the fall. They set us back about three months. *What's So Wrong with Doing Right* should be available on Amazon in the near future. I appreciate your patience.
